

WHEN YOU COULD EXCHANGE A PAIR OF NICKERS FOR GOLD

On 26th February 1797 the Bank of England issued the first ever one pound note following gold shortages caused by the French Revolutionary Wars. The earliest notes were handwritten and were issued as needed to named individuals. These notes were written on one side only and bore the name of the payee, the date and the signature of the issuing cashier. Between 1797 and 1821 the lack of bullion meant that banks would not exchange banknotes for gold, but after the end of the Napoleonic Wars the shortage improved and notes could be exchanged for an equivalent amount of gold to individual payees when presented at the bank once again. One pound notes ceased to be issued in 1821 and were replaced by gold sovereigns.

By the time of the First World War, the government wanted to maintain its stocks of gold so banks were ordered to stop changing banknotes for gold. Gold sovereigns were replaced by one pound notes issued by the Treasury, which were nicknamed 'Johns' as the signature of Sir John Bradbury, Permanent Secretary to the Treasury, was used on them. The first notes printed after WW1 were two-sided green notes with the declaration "I promise to pay the bearer on demand the sum of one pound" replacing the name of the payee.

Britain returned to the gold standard in 1925 although the Bank of England were only obliged to change notes for gold in multiples of 400 troy ounces (about 12000g). The printing of one pound notes moved to the Bank of England in 1928 and the possibility of exchanging them for gold stopped in 1931 when Britain stopped using the gold standard.

In 1940, following the discovery of secret Nazi plans to forge British paper money, one pound notes were issued in a new blue-orange colour scheme to deter counterfeiters, although the design remained the same. After the war, they returned to their original green colour.

A new design for one pound notes was introduced in 1960, with the old notes ceasing to be legal tender in 1962. Following a consultation with retailers and other groups it was announced in July 1981 that the one pound note would be replaced by a coin, first introduced in April 1983. The one pound note ceased to be legal tender on 11 March 1988 although the Bank of England will exchange old £1 notes for their face value in perpetuity.

The second half of the programme features Jonathan Willcocks – A Great and Glorious Victory which dramatically chronicles the events of the 1805 Battle of Trafalgar with an overriding message of the triumph of humanity over the horrors of warfare.
