A FACT TO KETCHUP WITH

In the 1830s, tomato ketchup was sold as a medicine that could help with ailments like diarrhoea, indigestion, rheumatism and jaundice. The idea was initially proposed in 1834 by Dr. John Cook Bennett, an American physician, who recognised the medicinal properties of tomatoes. After initially selling it as a mixture, he later decided to sell the recipe in the form of 'tomato pills'.


These tomato pills became so popular that copycats flooded the market. These copycat pills claimed to cure a wider range of ailments including fixing broken bones and healing vitamin deficiencies like scurvy. However, they mostly only contained laxatives and no tomato at all. This gradually led to the downfall of the trend, leading to the end of the tomato pills empires and ketchup itself by1850. It wasn't until 1876 that Henry Heinz created today's version of tomato ketchup. And the rest, as they say, is history!

OUR SUSSEX POET LAUREATE

Hilaire Belloc was born in France in 1870 to a wealthy French father and English mother a few days before the Franco-Prussian War broke out. The family fled to England at the news of the French army's collapse, returning after the war's end to discover that the Belloc home had been looted and vandalized by Prussian soldiers. He is often referred to as the Sussex Poet Laureate owing to his many writings about our county as he grew up in Sussex, spending his boyhood at Slindon and most of his life in Sussex.

He wrote about his home in poems such as "West Sussex Drinking Song", "The South Country", and "Ha'nacker Mill". One of his best-known works relating to Sussex is The Four Men: A Farrago, written in 1911, in which the four characters, each having aspects of Belloc's personality, travel on a pilgrimage across the county from Robertsbridge to Harting.

Belloc became a naturalised British subject in 1902 while retaining his French citizenship. From 1906 to 1910, he served as a Liberal member of parliament, one of only a few openly Catholic members.



In 1941 his beloved son, Peter Gilbert Marie Sebastian Belloc, died at the age of 36 of pneumonia. He fell ill while on active service with the 5th Battalion, Royal Marines in Scotland. In that same year Belloc suffered a stroke and never recovered from its effects. He also suffered burns and shock after falling on his fireplace at his home in Shipley later that year. He died on 16 July 1953 at a Nursing Home in Guildford.
